*Soils are highly variable, even at short spatial scales, their characteristics defined by the physical environment (geology (solid and drift), topography, aspect and climate as well as biological influences and time). There are in excess of 700 different soil types in the UK. Soils provide a multitude of ecosystem services, from supporting habitats and land management systems to carbon sequestration, flood risk management and health and wellbeing benefits. Understanding the nature of the soils that lie within a catchment, and how their properties influence the way the system functions, is critical in supporting decision making. This presentation will look at the key soil characteristics and their importance to catchment functioning and management.*

*The Living Went project is focussed on improving river habitat for fish and a variety of other species, reducing agricultural run-off and reducing unnatural erosion and sediment. This is through a suite of interventions aimed at enhancing as many sections of the river as possible whilst working on landowner and volunteer engagement programmes. Chloe will be talking about what the Trust has already done and what their plans for the rest of the life of the project are.*
